

Mystical Themes in the Poetry of Leonard Cohen: His Spiritual and Philosophical Influences

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Abstract

This study aims to explore the mystical themes present in the poetry of Leonard Cohen and to examine the spiritual and philosophical influences that shaped his literary works. Leonard Cohen, a celebrated poet and musician, was known for his deep and introspective poetry that delved into themes of love, spirituality, and the human condition. His work has been compared to that of mystics and spiritual leaders, such as Rumi and Kabbalists, and this study seeks to identify and analyze the mystical elements in his poetry. Through an examination of his life, influences, and literary works, this study aims to provide insight into the spiritual and philosophical dimensions of Cohen's poetry, highlighting its relevance to contemporary discussions on spirituality, mysticism, and the human experience. المخلص

Introduction

Leonard Cohen, a Canadian poet, singer-songwriter, and novelist, gained recognition for his artistic creations that delve into subjects such as spirituality, love, and human connections. His poetry is often described as mystical because it deals with abstract concepts and seeks to transcend the boundaries of rational thought and language. The mystical themes in Cohen's poetry are closely linked to his spiritual and philosophical influences. Cohen's artistic journey was profoundly shaped by Jewish mysticism, specifically the teachings of the Kabbalah. Additionally, his exposure to Buddhist philosophy during his stay at a Zen monastery in California left a lasting impact on him. Buddhist philosophy highlights the transient nature of existence and the significance of embracing the present moment (Freedman 2021). This philosophy is

reflected in Cohen's poetry, which often deals with themes of impermanence, change, and the search for meaning in life. Cohen's poetry also reflects his interest in the works of the Spanish mystic St. John of the Cross, who wrote about the experience of union with God through contemplation and spiritual discipline. Cohen's poetry often explores similar themes of spiritual longing and transcendence, and his use of language is often deeply metaphorical and symbolic. Generally, the mystical themes in Leonard Cohen's poetry reflect his deep interest in spirituality and philosophy, and his search for meaning in a world that often seems chaotic and uncertain.

Cohen's fascination with philosophy, specifically the idea of impermanence, as outlined in Buddhist philosophy, has greatly impacted his poetry. This influence has motivated him to delve into the ephemeral aspects of life and emphasize the significance of embracing the present moment. This theory suggests that Cohen's poetry reflects his interest in Buddhist teachings on mindfulness and the search for inner peace. The mystical themes in the poetry of Leonard Cohen are closely related to his spiritual and philosophical influences, and that his poetry reflects his deep interest in exploring the nature of the self, the world, and the divine (Freeman 2021 13-15). His poetry is known for its lyrical beauty and its ability to evoke a sense of spiritual transcendence. In addition, Cohen's poetry reflects his interest in spiritual and philosophical concepts, including Jewish mysticism, Buddhist philosophy, and mystical union with the divine. All of these influences are expressed through his use of language, and his poetry invites readers to explore these themes and ideas in a profound and meaningful way.

The poem "Suzanne," which was later turned into a song, is perhaps one of Cohen's most famous works. It tells the story of a woman named Suzanne who takes the speaker on a journey through the city and to the river. It is a mystical poem that explores the complexities of love, desire, and spirituality. Suzanne, the titular character, is a symbol of both the divine and the earthly. The boats passing by represent the passage of time and the journey of life. The speaker is drawn to Suzanne's madness because it represents a kind of spiritual awakening, an escape from the mundane. The poem is filled with religious and spiritual imagery, including references to Jesus and Buddha, and it explores themes of love, beauty, and transcendence.

You can hear the boats go by
You can spend the night beside her
And you know that she's half crazy
But that's why you want to be there (2-5)

In the song "Suzanne," the sound of passing boats fills the air. It is possible to spend the night with Suzanne, even though she may be a bit eccentric. However, it's precisely her unconventional nature that draws you to her. She nourishes you with tea and oranges, imported from distant China. Just when you're about to admit that you can't offer her love, she manages to understand you perfectly. She allows the river to respond, affirming that you have always been her beloved. The poem explores the theme of the divine feminine through the character of Suzanne. The speaker is drawn to her despite her supposed madness, and she provides him with nourishment and exotic gifts. When the speaker tries to distance himself emotionally, Suzanne brings him back into her embrace, revealing a deeper spiritual connection between them. Artistically, the song's brilliance lies in its pairing of a spare, hypnotic melody with evocative lyrics: "Now Suzanne takes you down/To her place near the river/You can hear the boats go by/You can spend the night beside her/And you know she's half crazy." This poem suggests that imperfection and brokenness are necessary for spiritual growth and enlightenment (Freeland 2019). The cracks in our lives allow us to see the light that shines through them, and we should not strive for perfection but instead embrace our flaws and weaknesses.

"The Window" by Leonard Cohen contains several mystical and spiritual themes that invite readers to explore deeper layers of existence and contemplate the nature of the divine."The song 'The Window' is intricate, featuring poetic symbols that aren't readily apparent in their meaning.(Cohen 2009).

The poem opens with the image of someone standing by the window, seemingly absorbed by the external beauty. This person represents the seeker who is captivated by the outer world, symbolizing the conventional understanding of reality. However, the poem quickly reveals that this beauty is accompanied

by pain and suffering, represented by the "thorn of the night" and the "spear of the age." This juxtaposition suggests that the material world is intertwined with challenges and hardships.

Why do you stand by the window
Abandoned to beauty and pride
The thorn of the night in your bosom
The spear of the age in your side
Lost in the rages of fragrance
Lost in the rags of remorse
Lost in the waves of a sickness
That loosens the high silver nerves (1-8)

As the poem progresses, the person is described as being lost in various emotions and experiences, such as the "rages of fragrance" and the "rags of remorse." These images suggest the limitations and entanglements of worldly attachments and desires, highlighting the transient and illusory nature of such experiences. The poem addresses the person as "chosen love" and "frozen love," indicating a deeper, spiritual aspect of their being. It acknowledges the complexity and paradoxical nature of love, which can simultaneously inspire and constrain. The line "Oh tangle of matter and ghost" further emphasizes the intertwining of the physical and spiritual realms, suggesting that true understanding lies beyond the material world. The speaker then calls upon the person to emerge from the "cloud of unknowing" and make contact with something divine. The act of kissing the cheek of the moon and the reference to the New Jerusalem, a symbol of spiritual perfection, signify a longing for transcendence and union with the divine. It suggests that true fulfillment and understanding can be found by transcending the limitations of the material world and embracing a spiritual path.

Oh chosen love, Oh frozen love
Oh tangle of matter and ghost
Oh darling of angels, demons and saints
And the whole broken-hearted host
Gentle this soul (9-13)

The poem questions why the person remains in a state of ruin and suffering without expressing their discomfort. This inquiry invites reflection on the necessity of acknowledging and confronting one's pain in order to embark on a spiritual journey. The metaphor of climbing on tears and being silent like a rose on a ladder of thorns implies the need to endure suffering without succumbing to despair, as it may be a transformative process leading to spiritual growth.

And come forth from the cloud of unknowing
And kiss the cheek of the moon
The New Jerusalem glowing
Why tarry all night in the ruin
And leave no word of discomfort
And leave no observer to mourn
But climb on your tears and be silent
Like a rose on its ladder of thorns
Oh chosen love, Oh frozen love (14-22)

In the final stanza, the poem suggests a path of spiritual purification and transformation. The person is encouraged to lay their rose (symbolic of their existence) on the fire, representing a willingness to surrender and let go of attachments. The fire then gives itself up to the sun, symbolizing the process of enlightenment and union with the divine. This transformation culminates in the embrace of the "high holy one," signifying a mystical union and transcendent experience.

Then lay your rose on the fire
The fire give up to the sun
The sun give over to splendour
In the arms of the high holy one

For the holy one dreams of a letter
Dreams of a letter's death
Oh bless thee continuous stutter
Of the word being made into flesh
Oh chosen love, Oh frozen love (23-32)

It can be realized that "The Window" explores mystical and spiritual themes by contrasting the superficial beauty of the material world with the deeper yearning for spiritual fulfillment. It invites readers to reflect on the limitations of worldly attachments and the transformative potential of embracing a spiritual path. "The window in this poem is open to a reality beyond this world, beyond death, bringing light for those willing to see it." (Cohen 2009). The poem suggests that true understanding, peace, and union with the divine can be attained by transcending the constraints of the material realm and seeking a mystical connection with the higher reality.

In "The Stranger Song," Cohen delves into the human experience of pursuing spiritual fulfillment amidst the trials of worldly life. The central character is an unfamiliar figure on a quest to discover meaning in a world characterized by deceit and disillusionment. The mention of "dealers" implies that the protagonist has been let down by individuals who promised spiritual enlightenment but instead took advantage of him. The imagery of reaching for the sky while surrendering reflects the protagonist's inner conflict between his spiritual aspirations and the limitations imposed by his physical existence. The poem concludes by acknowledging the scarcity of reliable support in the face of such challenges. However, it suggests that despite the difficulties, the pursuit of spiritual enlightenment remains a worthwhile endeavor.

It's true that all the men you knew were dealers
Who said they were through with dealing
Every time you gave them shelter
I know that kind of man, it's hard to hold the hand of anyone
Who is reaching for the sky just to surrender
Who is reaching for the sky just to surrender1-6)

And then leaning on your window sill, he'll say one day you caused his will
To weaken with your love and warmth and shelter
And then taking from his wallet an old schedule of trains, he'll say
"I told you when I came I was a stranger
I told you when I came I was a stranger"(7-11)

The stranger mentioned in the poem represents a figure who wants the listener to disregard their own dreams and spiritual aspirations. This could be seen as an external force or influence that distracts the seeker from their own inner path to enlightenment. The stranger's desire for shelter suggests a longing for security and comfort, which can be seen as a desire for worldly attachments and a retreat from the demands of spiritual exploration.

The reference to the "golden arm dispatching cards" can be understood as a symbol of the seeker's previous confidence and success in navigating the spiritual realm. However, the rusted arm from the elbow to the finger signifies a loss of spiritual power or a decline in the seeker's connection to the divine. The mention of the dealers, who claim to have given up their deceptive ways, but constantly seek shelter, can represent the challenges and temptations faced on the spiritual path. These dealers may symbolize false prophets or individuals who exploit the seeker's vulnerability for personal gain.

The closing lines speak to the difficulty of forming a genuine connection with someone who is constantly reaching for the sky, only to surrender. In the context of mysticism, this can be seen as a cautionary message about the challenge of finding true spiritual companionship or guidance. It suggests that it is hard to establish a deep connection with individuals who lack the perseverance or commitment to transcend earthly limitations and fully embrace the mystical journey. These lines reflect the obstacles and pitfalls encountered

on the path of mysticism, reminding the seeker to be discerning, stay true to their own spiritual aspirations, and be cautious of external influences that may distract or mislead them.

But now another stranger seems to want you to ignore his dreams

As though they were the burden of some other

O you've seen that man before, his golden arm dispatching cards

But now it's rusted from the elbow to the finger

And he wants to trade the game he plays for shelter

Yes, he wants to trade the game he knows for shelter (21-26)

The song "Hallelujah" is a meditation on the power of music to express and evoke spiritual experiences. The Oxford English Dictionary defines hallelujah as "a song or shout of praise to God," but biblical scholars will tell you it's actually a smash-up of two Hebrew words: "hallel" meaning "to praise" and "jah" meaning Yahweh, or God. (Netburn 2021) The song opens by alluding to King David from the Bible, highlighting how his skillful harp playing could calm Saul. This serves as the foundation for David's ascent to power and the uniting of the Jewish community. The initial verse also acknowledges the listener's lack of interest in music. The reference to David playing a secret chord that pleased the Lord is a biblical allusion to the idea that music has the power to transcend human experience and connect us to the divine.

Now I've heard there was a secret chord

That David played, and it pleased the Lord

But you dont really care for music, do you?

It goes like this, the fourth, the fifth

The minor falls, the major lifts

The baffled king composing Hallelujah

Hallelujah, Hallelujah

Hallelujah, Hallelujah (1-8)

The use of the musical terminology, such as the fourth and fifth, suggests a technical appreciation for music, but also highlights the complexity of the emotional and spiritual experiences that can be expressed through music. The reference to the baffled king composing Hallelujah suggests that the search for spiritual fulfilment is often accompanied by feelings of confusion and uncertainty, but the use of the word Hallelujah suggests that the ultimate goal is to achieve a state of joyful praise and gratitude. First, they highlight the power of music to express and evoke spiritual experiences, which is a recurring theme in Cohen's poetry. Second, the reference to the "secret chord" that pleased the Lord can be seen as an allusion to the mystical and transcendent nature of spiritual experience, which is often shrouded in mystery and hidden from ordinary perception. Finally, the image of the "baffled king composing Hallelujah" suggests that the pursuit of spiritual enlightenment can be a confusing and challenging process, but ultimately leads to a state of joyful praise and gratitude.

The poem illustrates the complex interplay between the material and spiritual worlds in Cohen's poetry, and the importance of art and music in expressing and accessing the transcendent. They also underscore the central themes of spiritual longing and quest for enlightenment that run throughout Cohen's work. "Hallelujah" is both straightforward and cryptic in its meaning. Each verse ends with the word "hallelujah," which is repeated four times, creating a prayer-like chant. The word "hallelujah" has different connotations in the Old and New Testaments. In the Hebrew Bible, it is a compound word meaning "to praise joyously" and refers to singing praises to God. In the Christian tradition, "hallelujah" is a word of praise rather than a directive to praise.

However, the song quickly undercuts its own seriousness by highlighting the listener's indifference towards music. This juxtaposition adds a touch of humor to the song. Cohen then describes the harmonic progression of the song and the contrast between minor and major keys. He ends the verse with the line "the baffled king composing Hallelujah!" which reflects the mysterious and enigmatic nature of artistic creation and romantic love. By referencing the unknowable aspects of music and reducing even revered figures like King David to mere craftsmen, Cohen offers a deeper perspective on the nature of art and its power.

Conclusion

Leonard Cohen's poetry is infused with mystical and spiritual themes that reflect his deep engagement with Jewish mysticism, Zen Buddhism, and Christian theology. His poems explore the human condition of seeking meaning and transcendence in a world that often feels confusing and uncertain. Through his use of rich imagery and symbolism, Cohen creates a mystical atmosphere that invites the reader to contemplate the deeper aspects of life and the universe. Whether it is through the haunting melodies of his songs or the thought-provoking lyrics of his poems, Cohen's artistry continues to inspire and challenge audiences to seek a deeper understanding of the mysteries of existence.
